
Provided shopping cards and cash grants to those experiencing severe hardship, alongside the offer of holistic advice



3,154 clients were supported, with crisis support at the value of **£260,075**



77% of clients engaged with holistic advice, with top advice being in benefits and utilities

Delivered via **two CABs** – urban and rural Experienced advisers




Targeted support for those with:

- > Food needs and not yet able to engage with advice
- > Priority family groups
- > Single adult households
- > Access to cash



Monitoring, evaluation and real time learning



The story so far – emerging findings

- > Supported **108 clients**, with **424 contacts**
- > Unpredictability of circumstances
- > Building trust takes time
- > Small actions with big impact
- > Overwhelming positive feedback
- > Advisers don't have a magic wand
